School Uniform in Winter

As the weather is very cold, I am asking parents to be mindful of the uniform that their child/ren are wearing to school. Children need to be wearing items from our winter uniform, not our summer uniform. It is important that our children are warm and comfortable during this season, however, there are standards that we would like to maintain. Students must be in full school uniform at all times. The winter uniform available to our families includes many items such as Jackets, Polar Fleece Vests, Wool Blend Jumpers and Box Pleat Skirts. Students should not be wearing coloured tights or leggings under their summer dress, as this is not part of our correct school uniform. If you would like your child to wear tights under their winter pinafore for extra warmth, they need to be navy in line with our uniform policy. Students should also be wearing navy pants or shorts (not black) and **black** shoes. 
Due dates for incursions, excursions and camps

When events such as incursions and excursions are published through Compass, there is a process that sits behind that to ensure all requirements are covered and that you are given adequate time to make payment. Please remember that the final date is just that, the FINAL date, and no payment will be accepted after the final due date. Compass will send you reminders to alert you if you haven't paid, however, I ask that you please be vigilant and regularly check Compass as we have had children miss out on excursions as payment was not made by the due date and we would, of course, like to avoid this in the future.

Family holidays during the school term

Schools generally advise against planning family holidays within term time, due to the impact this can have on missed learning for students. If you do decide to proceed with taking your child out of school for 3 or more days, the holiday absence needs to be approved by me as part of DET requirements. THE GRADE 3 TEACHERS ARE TAKING ACTION AND WE NEED YOUR SUPPORT!

We have been learning about how technology impacts communication and connection and have found out about how our students are using technology. We are growing concerned for the future generations and how they use and interact online.



36 months is a campaign to **raise the age for using social media from 13 to 16** to help keep kids **safer online**. 

YASEMIN




BIANCA
